The history of the Barnes family in America began 370 years ago (in 2026). It began on 27 June 1656 with the arrival of Thomas Barnes in Boston Harbor on the ship *Speedwell*. Thomas Barnes was 20 years of age, and he was single.

The *Speedwell* had left Gravesend, England on 30 May 1656, so the trip took about a month. There were 41 passengers on board. The original Passenger List is shown below.¹

Thomas Barnes went first to Marlborough, and in fact, he was one of the original settlers of that place. In 1656, several families from Sudbury, Massachusetts, led by Edmund Rice, John Howe, John Ruddock, and John Bent, petitioned the Massachusetts General Court to create a new town.² Within a few decades, all of these men (except Edmund Rice) would become in-laws of Thomas through his marriage and through that of his son and grandson.

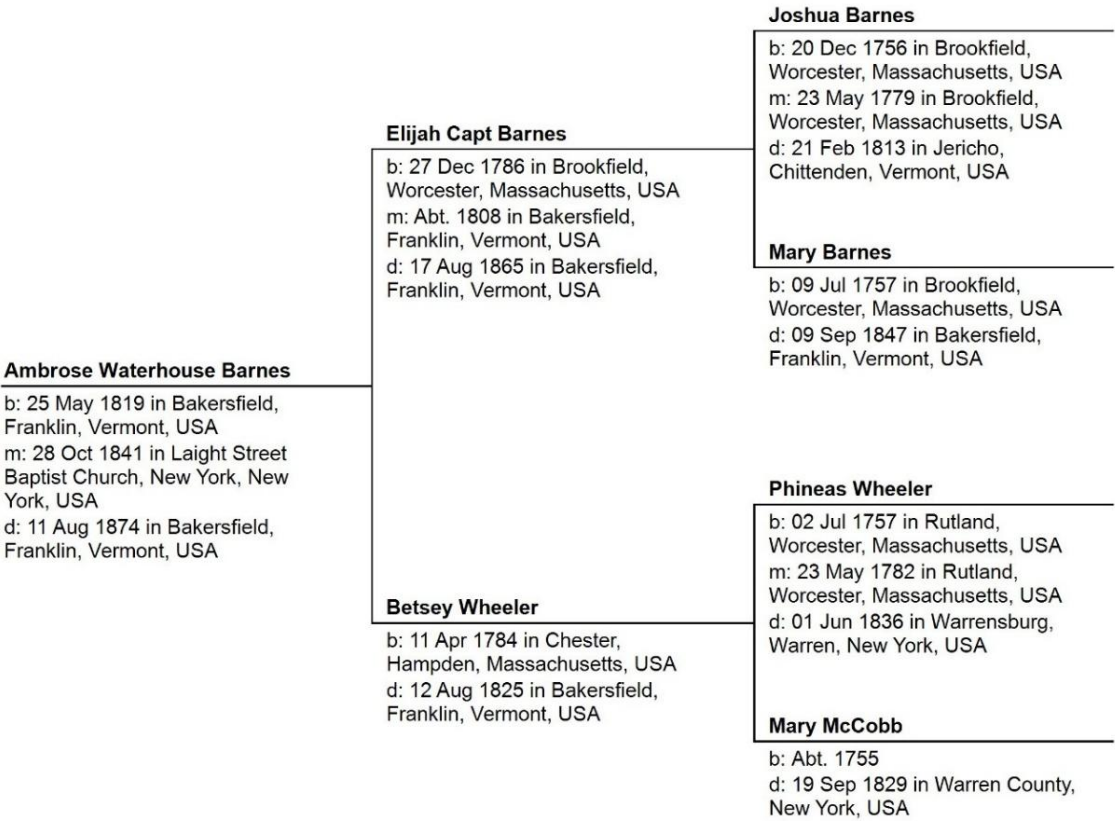
Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes was the four-greats grandson of Thomas Barnes (1636-1679), and, as such, he was a seventh generation American!³

Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes was born on 25 May 1819 in Bakersfield in Franklin County, Vermont. Refer to Appendix A for this and many other records.

Over the years, the Barnes family had migrated from Marlborough, Massachusetts to Brookfield, Massachusetts to Bakersfield, Vermont.

Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes was the son of Captain Elijah Barnes [born 1786 in Brookfield, son of Joshua Barnes] and of Betsey Wheeler [born 1784, daughter of Phineas Wheeler].

It is interesting to note that both grandfathers of Ambrose W. Barnes, Joshua Barnes and Phineas Wheeler, were Patriots who served in the Revolutionary War.



Captain Elijah Barnes and Betsey Wheeler were married in about 1808 in Bakersfield, Vermont.

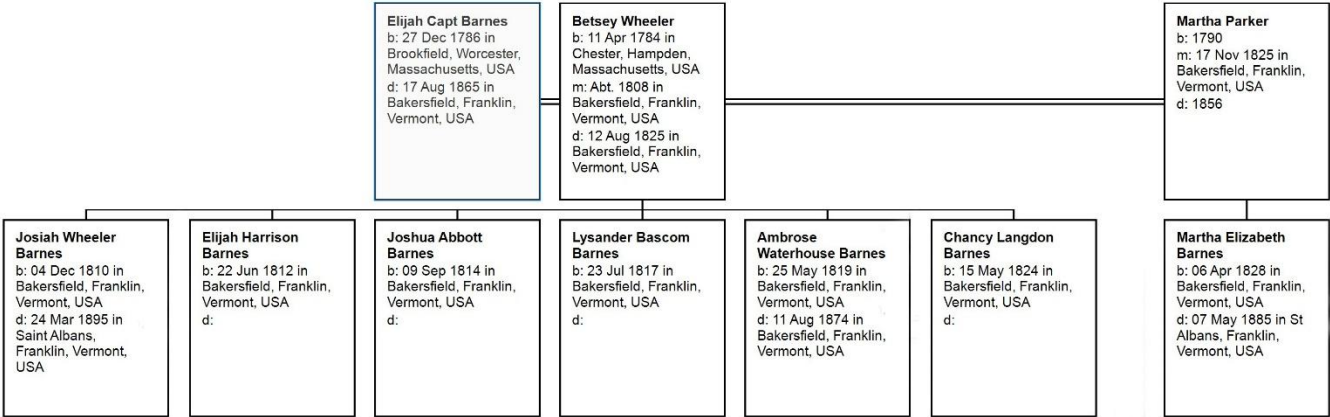

³ Thomas, Thomas, Noah, Thomas, Joshua, Elijah. In fact, Ambrose W. was an *eighth* generation American on several of his other lines.

Sadly, Betsey Wheeler Barnes died in August of 1825, when Ambrose Waterhouse was just 6 years of age. That meant that Elijah lost his wife of 16 years and that also meant that he was left on his own with six children between the ages of one year and 15 years!

Elijah Barnes married Martha Parker on 17 Nov 1825 (just three months after the death of his first wife). It was Martha's first marriage. Martha Parker was born on 03 May 1790 in Phillipston, Worcester, Massachusetts, not far from where Elijah Barnes was born. The Parker family had moved to Bakersfield, Vermont in about 1797. Thus, Elijah and Martha likely had known each other for some time before their marriage. At the time of their marriage, Elijah was 39 and Martha was 35. Elijah and Martha had one child, a daughter, Martha Elizabeth Barnes, born April 1828. Thus, there were now seven children in the Barnes household.



Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes received his education in the schools of Bakersfield. Then, he went to New York City in 1840, when he was just 21 years of age. He was a poor boy, without friends or acquaintances. But he had a slight knowledge of the chair making business, and he soon obtained employment in that branch of industry.

Note: There is a reference to a “Barnes, W.W. & A”, occupation mfg. of cabinet ware in Franklin, Vermont in 1843. (See Appendix A.) This is suggestive that someone named “Barnes” was involved in the manufacture of furniture, perhaps chairs, in the 1840s in Franklin, Vermont. Could this have been Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes, or some relatives, in the area?

According to contemporary newspaper reports, in 1842 and again in 1844 Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes experienced two thefts from his place of business. The first incident involved the theft of a Winsor chair from 142 Chatham Street; and the second involved a theft of two chairs from 144 Chatham Street. (These newspaper reports confirm that Ambrose Waterhouse was, in fact, engaged in manufacturing chairs in Lower Manhattan in the early 1840s.)

At age 22 years, Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes married Elizabeth Littell (age 18) on 28 Oct 1841 at Laight Street Baptist Church, in Manhattan.

Elizabeth Littell was born on 02 January 1823 in New York City. Elizabeth was the daughter of George Littell and Maria (Mary) Hinton, who were married on 27 April 1818 in New York City.



Ambrose Waterhouse and Elizabeth Barnes had the following children. All the children were born in New York City except the last, who was born in Bloomfield, New Jersey.

In 1848, at age 29, Ambrose Waterhouse was able to start a business for himself, which he did at 152 and 154 Chatham Street in New York.⁴ (Note that this address is very close to where Ambrose W. was working in 1842 and 1844.)

He built a large business in the manufacture of chairs which were sent to all parts of the country, notably to California by Clipper ship in 1849 and after.

According to the 1867 New York City Directory, the business was still at its original location in that year (19 years later).

In 1870, however, two addresses were listed for the factory: the original Chatham Street address and a new one at 438 and 440 Pearl Street⁵ (NY City Directory). By 1872, the transition was complete (NY City Directory), and the factory was at the new location on Pearl Street.

With the new factory complete, bedroom furniture was added to the line.

At this time, Ambrose Waterhouse took his eldest son (Ambrose Edward) into partnership, but never resigned active control, being a man of excessively energetic impulses and never happy unless employed.

Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes and family were long-time members of the Lee Avenue Baptist Church in Williamsburg. (Later, the name of this church was changed to the First Free Baptist Church.)

Apparently, in the mid-1850s, Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes was active in politics, in the Whig Party and in the Know-Nothing Party. (Refer to Appendix A and Appendix B.)

Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes, during his business career, amassed considerable property, which he did not hesitate to use for charitable purposes.

Elizabeth Littell Barnes was likely born in Williamsburg, Brooklyn. Thus, it seemed natural for the family to live there after the marriage in 1841. Indeed, the family was residing there in 1850 (US Census). By 1855, however, the family had moved to Lower Manhattan (NY State Census), very near the chair factory, which was on Chatham Street. By 1857, the family moved again, this time out into the country to Orange in Essex County, New Jersey (birth of youngest child and US Census). Orange, New Jersey is about 15 miles from the factory in Lower Manhattan. Thus, that would have required quite a long commute for Ambrose Waterhouse each day. The family stayed in Orange for several years but then, by 1865, had returned to Williamsburg (NY State Census). In 1867, the family resided at 42 South 10th Street in Williamsburg, Brooklyn (NY City Directory). Then, in 1872, the family moved a few doors away to 78 South 10th Street in Williamsburg (NY City Directory), where they remained until after Ambrose Waterhouse died in 1874.

Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes died on 11 August 1874 of apoplexy. He died suddenly while on a two-week trip to Vermont. The trip included a visit to his half-sister, Martha Elizabeth⁶ at the old homestead in Bakersfield, Vermont, followed by a stay in Saratoga, New York, where he was to be

⁴ Chatham Street was in lower Manhattan. However, it no longer exists. The closest current road in that vicinity is Park Row, which is near City Hall Park and the World Trade Center.

⁵ In an obituary for Ambrose Waterhouse, this location is (confusingly) referred to as Roosevelt Street. Roosevelt Street was a street located in the Two Bridges district of Lower Manhattan, which existed from the British colonial period up until the early 1950s, running from Pearl Street at Chatham Street southeast to South Street. The factory was never on Roosevelt Street.

⁶ Martha Elizabeth Barnes was the daughter of Elijah Barnes by his second wife, Martha Parker. At the time of the planned visit, Martha Elizabeth was 46 years of age and was married to Henry Martyn Stevens.

joined by his wife. Unfortunately, the trip was cut short by his death. Ambrose Waterhouse died at the residence of H.R. Start⁷ in Bakersfield.

On 14 August 1874, the body of Ambrose Waterhouse was transported from St Albans, Vermont to Green-Wood Cemetery in Brooklyn for burial.

Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes was buried in 1874 at Green-Wood Cemetery.

⁷ Henry Russell Start (1845–1905), a prominent Vermont attorney and later Associate Justice of the Vermont Supreme Court. Around 1874, he was actively running his law practice and teaching in Bakersfield, Vermont, and was elected the State's Attorney for Franklin County in 1876.

Obituary.

Ambrose W. Barnes.

The gentleman whose name heads this paragraph was born in Bakerfield, Vermont, in the year 1819. He received his education in the schools of his native town and came to New York in 1840, when he was just twenty-one years of age. He was a poor boy, without friends or acquaintances, but having a slight knowledge of the chair-making business, he soon obtained employment in that branch of industry. After a time he was enabled to start a business for himself, which he did some twenty-six years ago at 152 and 154 Chatham street, New York. Soon after starting thus he was married to Miss Elizabeth Littell, of New York. The fruits of the marriage have been five boys and four girls. All of the boys are living, and two of the daughters. Mr. Barnes, about five years ago removed to his present business location, 438 and 440 Pearl street. He took his eldest son into partnership, but never resigned active control, being a man of excessively energetic impulses and never happy unless employed. Mr. Barnes completed a new factory for the manufacture of chairs only a few months ago in Roosevelt street, New York. He has been a resident of Williamsburgh for about ten years. His death was a sudden one, the cause being apoplexy. He was on a visit to his native place and had reached St. Albans on his way to Saratoga, where he expected to meet his wife. He was a member of the Lee avenue Baptist church, which he joined some time ago. Mr. Barnes had, during his business career, amassed considerable property, which he did not hesitate to give for charitable purposes, and many of the recipients of his generosity sincerely regret his loss.

Elizabeth Littell Barnes lived for 35 years after the death of her husband in 1874.

For several years, Elizabeth remained at 78 South 10th Street in Williamsburg, with several of her children, Ambrose Edward, Edgar F., Frank Theodore, and Walter Fredrick. However, as the children grew up, they left the nest.⁸

In the 1880 US Census, Elizabeth, age 50, is shown living with her youngest son, Walter Frederick, age 22, at 111 Penn Street, which is about 10 blocks from where the family had lived in 1875. Walter Frederick was still working at the furniture factory.

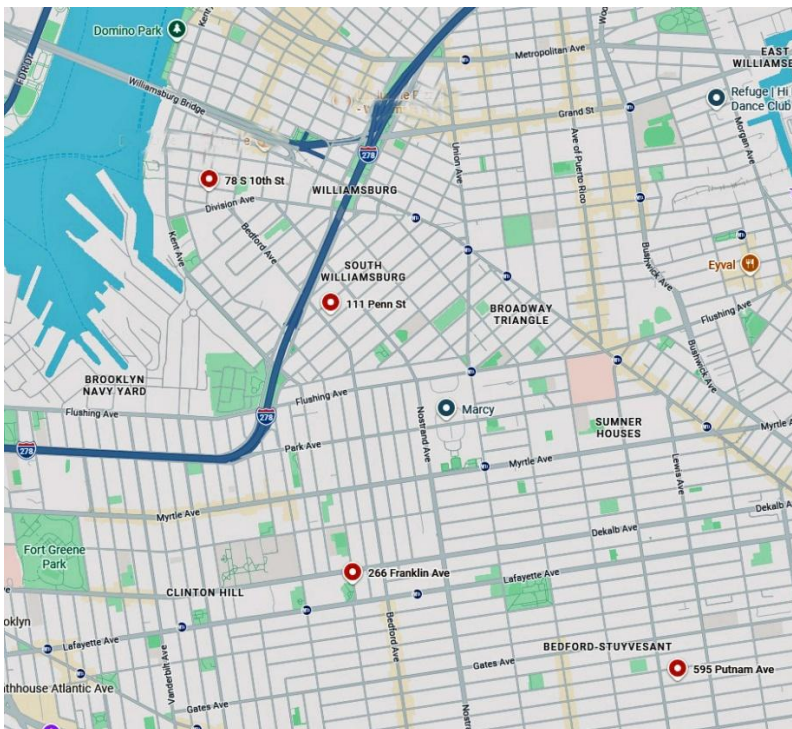
The 1881 Brooklyn City Directory shows that Elizabeth and Walter were still at that address. However, Walter Frederick got married at about that time.

Thus by 1883, whereas Elizabeth was still living at 111 Penn Street, Walter Frederick had moved, with his wife and baby, to a home at Greene Avenue at Nostrand Avenue, which is about one mile from 111 Penn Street.

It would seem, then, that Elizabeth Littell Barnes, age 60, was now living on her own, without parents, or siblings, without a husband or children. If that were the case, it would be the first time in her entire life that she was living on her own! There was plenty of money available. The furniture factory was at peak production. So, Elizabeth must have been well cared for. None-the-less. . .

By 1901, at age 78, Elizabeth was living at 266 Franklin Avenue, about a mile south. It is unknown with whom she was living, if anyone, at that time.

Finally, by about 1906, Elizabeth was living with her daughter, Victorine R. Barnes Gibson, at 595 Putnam Avenue (just south of Williamsburg) in Brooklyn.

⁸ Frank Theodore continued to work at the factory and, with his family, to live at 78 South 10th Street in Williamsburg. (1880 US Census)

Elizabeth Littell Barnes died on 13 January 1909 at 595 Putnam Avenue in Brooklyn at the home of her daughter, Victorine.

Elizabeth Littell Barnes was buried in 1909 at Green-Wood Cemetery.

Ambrose Waterhouse Barnes⁹ and Elizabeth Littell Barnes¹⁰ were buried at Green-Wood Cemetery at 500 25th Street in Brooklyn, Section 147, Lot 21831.

Lydia Ann O'Brien, colored, for stealing a bank note of \$20 from Platt H. Crosby, was sent up for 60 days. Jeremiah Crow, Peter Gardiner, and William Johnson, were tried for stealing a number of carpenter's tools from John Campbell, corner of avenue D and Eighth street. Crow and Gardner were sentenced to six months each, and Johnson was discharged.

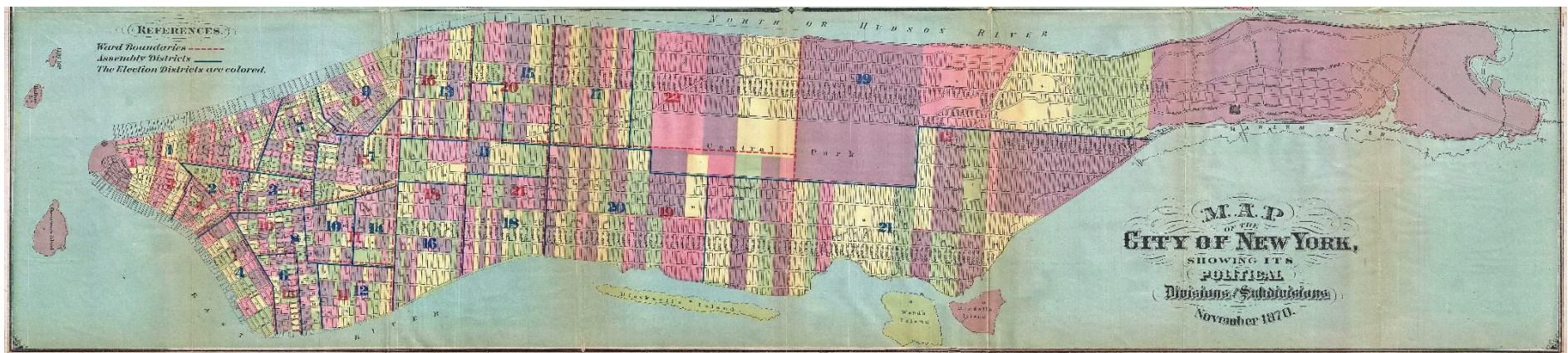

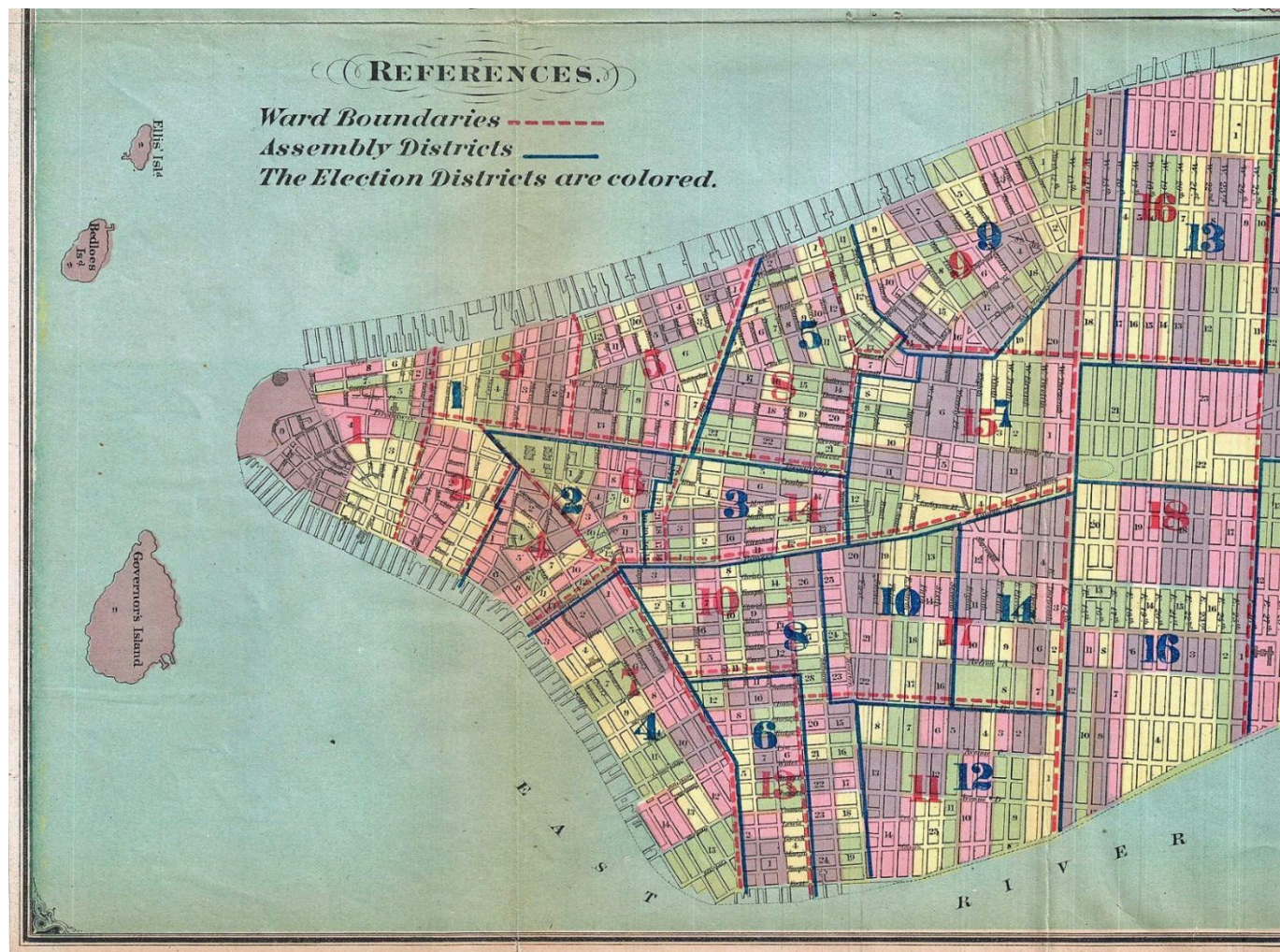
1855 New York State Census for Ambrose W. Barnes, showing the family in the 4th Election District of the 10th Ward of New York City.

WHIG ORGANIZATIONS FOR 1854.

The Primary Elections took place yesterday pursuant to call, and with the exception of the Seventh, Thirteenth, and a few other Wards, these gatherings exhibited much good feeling, even among the antagonist forces who had arrayed themselves in opposition for the honor of representing the Whig organizations for another year. There has been quite a change in the composition of the Whig Committees since last year, and many young men brought forward. Two of the Wards, it is supposed, are to be contested, where, it is asserted, that no legal election has taken place. The result in the Seventh Ward, where 305 votes were polled, was extremely close. The ticket headed by Zophar Mills had 156 votes, the tally list varied nine votes from the total, and the Barker ticket polled the remainder. Some excitement was produced as this result was announced, and it was attempted by a friend of the latter ticket to snatch the ballot-box from the Inspectors as they were taking it to the Station-House; but this was prevented and the box is now in the Station-House, where it has been determined to keep it until the assembling of the General Committee, January 3. It was proposed to extract the superfluous votes by blindfolding a boy; but this was abandoned and the whole matter referred to the members of the General Committee for them to decide.

Owing to the early hour of holding the polls the attendance at these elections was not large.

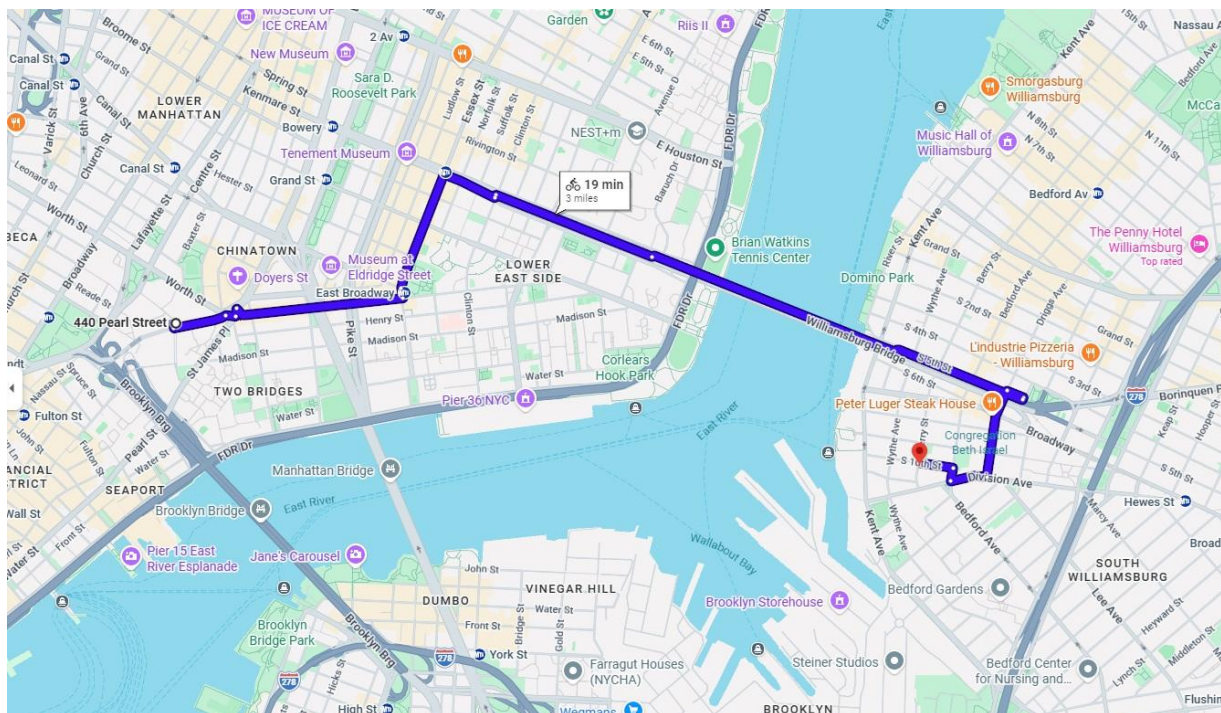

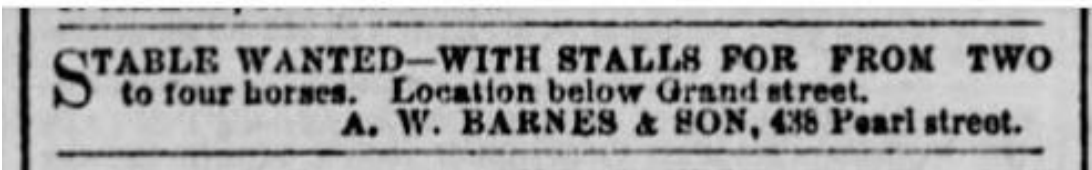

Appendix B: Whig Party and Know-Nothing Party

Whig Party

The American Whig Party was a major political party active from 1834 to the mid-1850s, formed in opposition to President Andrew Jackson's expansion of executive power. Champions of modernization, protective tariffs, and federal infrastructure funding, the party ultimately collapsed due to deep, irreconcilable internal divisions over the expansion of slavery.

Key Beliefs (The American System)

The Whigs favored an active, expansive federal government that would foster economic growth and national unity. Their core platform included:

- **Infrastructure:** Federal funding for roads, canals, and bridges.
- **Economics:** A protective tariff to shield American industry and the rechartering of a national bank.
- **Governance:** Congressional dominance over governing, opposing what they viewed as the "executive tyranny" of President Jackson (whom they dubbed "King Andrew").

Know-Nothing Party

The "Know Nothing" Party (officially the American Party) was a prominent 1850s American political movement driven by anti-immigrant and anti-Catholic sentiment. Originating as a secret society called the Order of the Star-Spangled Banner, it earned its nickname because members were instructed to say "I know nothing" when asked about the organization.

Core Beliefs and Platform

The Know Nothings were staunchly nativist. They believed that the United States should be governed solely by native-born, white Anglo-Saxon Protestants. Their platform focused on:

- **Restricting Immigration:** Enforcing harsh limits on the number of immigrants allowed into the country.
- **Lengthening Naturalization:** Extending the residency requirement for immigrants to become citizens and vote from 5 years to 21 years.
- **Excluding Catholics:** Barring the foreign-born from holding public office and fighting against Catholic influence, particularly in public education.
- **Temperance:** Pushing for strict anti-liquor and prohibition laws.

Political Rise

In the early 1850s, the Whig Party was disintegrating over the explosive issue of slavery, leaving many voters frustrated with the political establishment. The Know Nothings surged into this vacuum, campaigning on their anti-immigrant platform while largely avoiding the divisive issue

of slavery. At their peak, they controlled several state legislatures in the Northeast, elected dozens of congressmen, and held eight governorships.

Decline and Legacy

The party's momentum was short-lived. By the mid-1850s, the growing national crisis over slavery could no longer be ignored. At their 1856 national convention, the American Party split along regional lines over a proslavery platform. The Northern, anti-slavery members largely joined the newly formed Republican Party, while the Southern faction joined other groups. The party had largely dissolved by 1860, leaving a legacy as one of the most successful early third-party movements in American history.

Appendix C: DNA Relationships to Author
