Thank you for your reply of 28 Oct and the money order for \$75.00. I will keep in mind the name of Everett in the mid 19th. century period - it certainly seems to have been a family name - perhaps from a distaff side.

HILDRETH.

Searces have continued for this surname, as we have the marriage date for John Hildreth and Ann Birwick I made searches in the Marriage Bonds in the hope that they may have married by licence, and was pleased to find they did. The additional information found is given on sheet 1. I could obtain a photocopy if you wish. I am glad the ages of the parties were given, and the word 'upwards' means months. You will see that one of the co-bondsmen was a James Barwick of Yarm which is nineteen miles north of Sowerby in the parish of Thirsk. Yarm is five miles south of Stockton in Co. Durham where of course, John Hildreth married a second time.

A search was made for any will of Richard Hildreth who died in 1862 but I did not find any in that year, or in 1863.

Further searches were then made for the baptism of John Hildreth born ca. 1758. I tried the mother church of Thirsk, and in drawing a blank, decided to try Yark and its adjacent parish of Kirkleavington, sadly both these were also devoid of any Hildreth names in the period searched. I then concentrated on parishes and chapelries in the Sowerby-Thirsk area of Yorkshire, and these also failed to show any Hildeth names (sheet 1).

As luck would have it, the last parish I searched in this area was Felixkirk, some three miles north east of Sowerby. Here I was pleased to find Hildreth and variant names and was delighted to find a John Hildereth in 1757. Cleeves is four miles east of Sowerby, and I was in that area several years ago, and from which one has a magnificent view across the Vale of York to

the Yorkshire Dales, and in very good visibilty to the peaks of the Lake District.

I see that John's father was called Richard, and we know that John had a son of the same name who magnied Mary Wheatley. So it is clear that wider searches will be needed in the records of Felix-kink. If you are interested in a map of the area around Felixkirk I will be able to sent you one.

BIRWICK.

Although I headed this section 'Birwick', I rather think the spelling of John Hildreth's bride's surname was Barwick.

In all the searches for Hildreth names listed at the bottom of sheet 1 were also searched for Barwick and variant names, and I did not find mention of one. This made me check the I.G. I. of Yorkshire for any record of Ann Barwick ca. 1755 and I found three about that period (sheet 2). All three parishes are about seventeen miles from Sowerby. In checking the parishes for further details I searched firstly, Stokesley as this parish is six miles south east of Yarm - where the co-bondsman James Barwick lived in 1780.

The period of search was 1756 to 1762 and I found one entry only of this surname, and it was very pleasing to find that the occupation of the father James Barwick was the same as that given in the 1780 marriage bond.

So I think a wider search in the records of Stokesley will be needed to find more details of the family of James Barwick. You will see I found no siblings of Ann from 1758 to 1762 and it might be that this family had moved to Yarm.

I have in fact spent a little more that the four hours I allowed for this search for the baptismal records of John Hildreth and, hopefully, Ann Barwick. So with the balance you have sent me, I will continue with the search in extending the Hildreth line.
